In Winter, some animals exchange their summer drab for the purest white.

- Camouflage is one factor.
- It is likely that the switch to winter whites offers other advantages.
- Scientists believe that if staying hidden were the only upside, many more snow dwellers would be white, but that is not the case.
- One theory is that a pale coat may have better insulating properties – because melanin, the substance responsible for coloured hair, is absent from white fur, leaving air spaces in the hair shaft.

Why do robin's have a red breast?

The robin's distinctive red breast is a beautiful sight as it's seen against a backdrop of fresh snow. It's actually a tool in their ongoing campaign to gain or retain territory, according to research from the University of Cambridge. All you need are:

- Seeds and grains (e.g. beans, rice, corn, sunflower seeds)
- Nut shells (optional)
- White glue or clear liquid glue
- Poster board or cardboard
- Small spoon

- Collect seeds of all sorts of shapes, sizes and colour. Rice, beans, bird seed, corn kernels, and sunflower seeds are examples of seeds that you can use.
