The Diana Fountain is a bronze statue of goddess Diana on a marble and stone fountain and at the junction of Chestnut and Lime Avenues.

It was designed 1637 King Charles I for his wife Henrietta Maria, and cost £200. The fountain was restored in 2009 as part of the Bushy Park Restoration Project.

#### Bees

An apiary is a location where the beehives of honey bees are kept.

#### a. Ait

Pronounced like eight and sometimes called an eyot. It is a river island found on the River Thames and its tributaries. An ait is characteristically long and narrow and formed initially from river deposits. This one is Glovers Island seen from Richmond Hill. Can you name any others?

## b. Acorns

After falling in autumn, acorns can produce a new oak sapling the following spring. But most acorns don't get the chance as they are a rich food source for wildlife including jays, mice, badgers and squirrels. The majority tend to be munched before they can germinate.

Humans can eat acorns too, but they need to be processed to get rid of the tannins first – they can be made into flour for bread, pancakes, pastries, cookies and even pasta. Useful when there is none in the shops!
